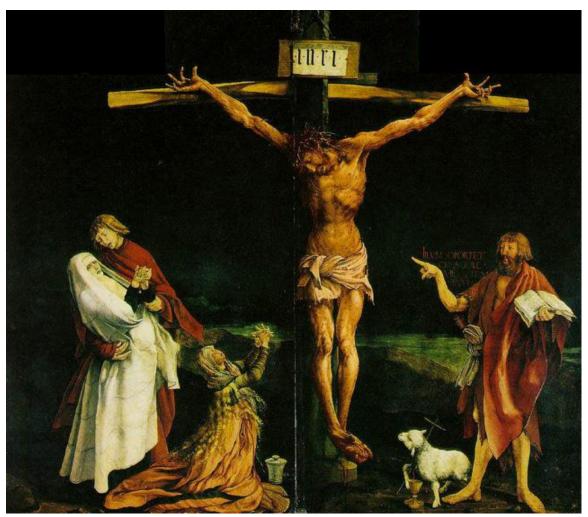

#### THE OFFICE OF GOOD FRIDAY

Chimes and instruments are silenced on Good Friday. The People stand as the Ministers enter.

SILENT PROCESSION (standing)

The Ministers enter in silence, and they prostrate themselves before the Altar. The People kneel.

SILENT PRAYER (kneeling)

OPENING ACCLAMATION (The Ministers rise; the People remain kneeling.)

Celebrant: All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way;

People: and the Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all.

COLLECT OF THE DAY (kneeling)

Celebrant: Let us pray. Good Friday

Almighty God, we beseech thee graciously to behold this thy family, for which our Lord Jesus Christ was contented to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of wicked men, and to suffer death upon the cross; who now liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost ever, one God, world without end. **Amen.** 

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON Reader: T. Young Isaiah 52:13-53:12

<sup>52:13</sup> Behold, my servant shall deal prudently, he shall be exalted and extolled, and be very high. <sup>14</sup> As many were astonished at thee; his visage was so marred more than any man, and his form more than the sons of men: 15 so shall he sprinkle many nations; the kings shall shut their mouths at him: for that which had not been told them shall they see; and that which they had not heard shall they consider. 53:1 Who hath believed our report? and to whom is the arm of the LORD revealed? <sup>2</sup> For he shall grow up before him as a tender plant, and as a root out of a dry ground; he hath no form nor comeliness; and when we shall see him, there is no beauty that we should desire him. <sup>3</sup> He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief; and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we esteemed him not. <sup>4</sup> Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. <sup>5</sup> But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed. <sup>6</sup> All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned everyone to his own way; and the LORD hath laid on him the iniquity of us all. <sup>7</sup> He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth; he is brought as a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is dumb, so he openeth not his mouth. 8 He was taken from prison and from judgment; and who shall declare his generation? for he was cut off out of the land of the living: for the transgression of my people was he stricken. <sup>9</sup> And he made his grave with the wicked, and with the rich in his death; because he had done no violence, neither was any deceit in his mouth. <sup>10</sup> Yet it pleased the LORD to bruise him; he hath put him to grief: when thou shalt make his soul an offering for sin, he shall see his seed, he shall prolong his days, and the pleasure of the LORD shall prosper in his hand. <sup>11</sup>He shall see of the travail of his soul, and shall be satisfied: by his knowledge shall my righteous servant justify many; for he shall bear their iniquities. <sup>12</sup> Therefore will I divide him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he hath poured out his soul unto death: and he was numbered with the transgressors; and he bare the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.

THE EPISTLE Reader: B. McAllister Hebrews 10:1-25

<sup>10:1</sup> For the law having a shadow of good things to come, and not the very image of the things, can never with those sacrifices which they offered year by year continually make the comers thereunto perfect. <sup>2</sup> For then would they not have ceased to be offered? because that the worshippers once purged should have had no more conscience of sins. <sup>3</sup> But in those sacrifices there is a remembrance again made of sins every year. <sup>4</sup>For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and of goats should take away sins. <sup>5</sup> Wherefore when he cometh into the world, he saith, "Sacrifice and offering thou wouldest not, but a body hast thou prepared me: 6 in burnt offerings and sacrifices for sin thou hast had no pleasure. 7 Then said I. 'Lo, I come (in the volume of the book it is written of me,) to do thy will, O God." 8 Above when he said, "Sacrifice and offering and burnt offerings and offering for sin thou wouldest not, neither hadst pleasure therein;" which are offered by the law; 9 then said he, "Lo, I come to do thy will, O God." He taketh away the first, that he may establish the second. <sup>10</sup> By the which will we are sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all. <sup>11</sup> And every priest standeth daily ministering and offering often times the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins: 12 but this man, after he had offered one sacrifice for sins forever, sat down on the right hand of God; <sup>13</sup> from henceforth expecting till his enemies be made his footstool. <sup>14</sup> For by one offering he hath perfected forever them that are sanctified. <sup>15</sup> Whereof the Holy Ghost also is a witness to us: for after that he had said before, <sup>16</sup> "This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, saith the Lord, I will put my laws into their hearts, and in their minds will I write them; <sup>17</sup> and their sins and iniquities will I remember no more." <sup>18</sup> Now where remission of these is, there is no more offering for sin. <sup>19</sup> Having therefore, brethren, boldness to enter into the Holiest Place by the blood of Jesus, <sup>20</sup> by a new and living way, which he hath consecrated for us, through the veil, that is to say, his flesh; <sup>21</sup> and having an high priest over the house of God; <sup>22</sup> let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience, and our bodies washed with pure water. <sup>23</sup> Let us hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering; (for he is faithful that promised;) <sup>24</sup> and let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works; <sup>25</sup> not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another; and so much the more, as ve see the day approaching.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: **Thanks be to God.** 

PASSION GOSPEL (sitting, the People reading the parts in bold)

John 19:1-37

Readers: Evangelist, T. Taylor; Pilate, A. Knight; Soldier, D. Hanley; Priest, T. Green

<sup>19:1</sup> Then Pilate therefore took Jesus, and scourged him. <sup>2</sup> And the soldiers platted a crown of thorns, and put it on his head, and they put on him a purple robe, <sup>3</sup> and said, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and they smote him with their hands. <sup>4</sup> Pilate therefore went forth again, and saith unto them, "Behold, I bring him forth to you, that ye may know that I find no fault in him." <sup>5</sup> Then came Jesus forth, wearing the crown of thorns, and the purple robe. And Pilate saith unto them, "Behold the man!" <sup>6</sup> When the chief priests therefore and officers saw him, they cried out, saying, "Crucify him! Crucify him!" Pilate saith unto them, "Take ye him, and crucify him: for I find no fault in him." <sup>7</sup> The Jews answered him, "We have a

law, and by our law he ought to die, because he made himself the Son of God." <sup>8</sup> When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he was the more afraid; <sup>9</sup> and went again into the judgment hall, and saith unto Jesus, "Whence art thou?" But Jesus gave him no answer. <sup>10</sup> Then saith Pilate unto him, "Speakest thou not unto me? knowest thou not that I have power to crucify thee, and have power to release thee?" <sup>11</sup> Jesus answered, "Thou couldest have no power at all against me, except it were given thee from above: therefore he that delivered me unto thee hath the greater sin."

<sup>12</sup> And from thenceforth Pilate sought to release him: but the Jews cried out, saying, "If thou let this man go, thou art not Cæsar's friend: whosoever maketh himself a king speaketh against Cæsar." <sup>13</sup> When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he brought Jesus forth, and sat down in the judgment seat in a place that is called the Pavement, but in the Hebrew, *Gabbatha*. <sup>14</sup> And it was the preparation of the Passover, and about the sixth hour: and he saith unto the Jews, "Behold your King!" <sup>15</sup> But they cried out, "Away with him! Away with him! Crucify him!" Pilate saith unto them, "Shall I crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but Cæsar!" <sup>16</sup> Then delivered he him therefore unto them to be crucified. And they took Jesus, and led him away.

<sup>17</sup> And he bearing his cross went forth into a place called the place of a skull, which is called in the Hebrew *Golgotha*: <sup>18</sup> where they crucified him, and two other with him, on either side one, and Jesus in the midst. <sup>19</sup> And Pilate wrote a title, and put it on the cross. And the writing was, "Jesus of Nazareth The King of the Jews." <sup>20</sup> This title then read many of the Jews: for the place where Jesus was crucified was nigh to the city: and it was written in Hebrew, and Greek, and Latin. <sup>21</sup> Then said the chief priests of the Jews to Pilate, "Write not, 'The King of the Jews;' but that he said, 'I am King of the Jews.'" <sup>22</sup> Pilate answered, "What I have written I have written." <sup>23</sup> Then the soldiers, when they had crucified Jesus, took his garments, and made four parts, to every soldier a part; and also his coat: now the coat was without seam, woven from the top throughout. <sup>24</sup> They said therefore among themselves, "Let us not rend it, but cast lots for it, whose it shall be:" that the Scripture might be fulfilled, which saith, "They parted my raiment among them, and for my vesture they did cast lots." These things therefore the soldiers did.

<sup>25</sup> Now there stood by the cross of Jesus his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Cleophas, and Mary Magdalene. <sup>26</sup> When Jesus therefore saw his mother, and the disciple standing by, whom he loved, he saith unto his mother, "Woman, behold thy son!" <sup>27</sup> Then saith he to the disciple, "Behold thy mother!" And from that hour that disciple took her unto his own home. <sup>28</sup> After this, Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished, that the scripture might be fulfilled, saith, "I thirst." <sup>29</sup> Now there was set a vessel full of vinegar: and they filled a sponge with vinegar, and put it upon hyssop, and put it to his mouth. <sup>30</sup> When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, he said, "It is finished." And he bowed his head, and gave up his spirit. (silence is kept)

<sup>31</sup> The Jews therefore, because it was the Preparation, that the bodies should not remain upon the cross on the Sabbath day, (for that Sabbath day was an high day), besought Pilate that their legs might be broken, and that they might be taken away. <sup>32</sup> Then came the soldiers, and brake the legs of the first, and of the other which was crucified with him. <sup>33</sup> But when they came to Jesus, and saw that he was dead already, they brake not his legs: <sup>34</sup> but one of the soldiers with a spear pierced his side, and forthwith came there out blood and water. <sup>35</sup> And he that saw it bare record, and his record is true: and he knoweth that he saith true, that ye might believe. <sup>36</sup> For these things were done, that the Scripture should be fulfilled, "A bone of him shall not be broken." <sup>37</sup> And again another Scripture saith, "They shall look on him whom they pierced."

The customary responses after the reading are omitted. A period of silence is kept.

#### THE ADORATION OF CHRIST CRUCIFIED

(Jesus reproached no one while dying; yet this ancient text tellingly contrasts God's merciful acts with our disobedience. The Passion was caused by the sins of all people of every time, not merely by the actions of first-century persons. The Savior intentionally died to forgive those transgressions and to free us from their power; thus our appropriate response to his loving "reproaches" is grateful repentance.)

THE REPROACHES (while the People kneel, a crucifix is unveiled on the Altar)

Celebrant: When I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw all the world to myself.

People: Lord, remember me when you come into your kingdom.

Celebrant: Father, into your hands I commend my spirit.

People: Lord, remember me when you come into your kingdom.

Celebrant: We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

People: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

A period of silence is kept.

Celebrant: My people, what have I done to you? How have I offended you? Answer me! I led you out

of Egypt, from slavery to freedom, but you led your Savior to the Cross.

People: Holy God! Holy and Mighty! Holy Immortal One, have mercy upon us.

*Celebrant:* For forty years I led you safely through the desert. I fed you with manna from heaven, and brought you to a land of plenty; but you led your Savior to the cross.

priests to his God and Father,
